<p>seasons</p>	<p>In the UK you might see:</p> <p>There are four seasons: Spring, Summer, Autumn and Winter.</p> <p>The length of a day varies depending on the season.</p>
<p>weather</p>	<p>Weather is the way the air and the atmosphere feel. It includes the outside temperature, strength of the wind, and whether it is raining, sunny, hailing, snowing, sleeting, foggy, or cloudy.</p> <p>The weather changes regularly and tends to be different during different seasons and across different countries.</p>
<p>Location</p>	<p>A location is particular place or position.</p>
<p>Polar Regions</p>	<p>The polar regions are two snowy and icy places at the top and the bottom of the earth. They are called the Arctic (North Pole) and Antarctica (South Pole). The polar regions are the coldest places on Earth and are also known as the frigid zones.</p>
<p>North Pole</p>	<p>The North Pole is the northernmost point of the Earth.</p> <p>Polar bears, ringed seals, snow bunting and arctic foxes live in the arctic region.</p>
<p>South Pole</p>	<p>The South Pole is the southernmost point of the Earth and is situated in Antarctica. Penguins live in the Antarctica.</p>
<p>equator</p>	<p>The equator is an imaginary line around the middle of the Earth. It is halfway between the North Pole and the South Pole.</p> <p>The equator divides the planet into a Northern Hemisphere and a Southern Hemisphere.</p> <p>Regions situated close to the equator are known as the Tropics and tend to be hot and dry places.</p>
